## Organizing with Custom Closets

### **Question: What do you think about custom closet systems? Are they worth the expense or can I make do with what I have?**

I love closet systems! They truly are the epitome of a well organized space. They function well, and they look slick, too.

Closets are meant to store large amounts of stuff in small spaces; and, we're in and out of them regularly. As such, they demand order and organization. In my house, the master closet functioned fine, but the kids' closets were another story. Despite my best efforts, I just couldn't make them work. I tried hanging sweater bags to utilize vertical space. I bought cubby boxes for shoes. I contained loose items in baskets. I used bins as make-shift "drawers." Still, they were a mess. One disastrous day, while stuffing clean clothes onto crowded shelves, a bin of off-season football equipment fell on my head. I'd had enough! I made a call to Closets to Go.

Their cost is higher, but you also get a full needs assessment, delivery, and installation.

Closets to Go custom-designed my children's closet systems. They spent considerable time with me analyzing both their current and future needs. They prepared detailed drawings and invited me to visit their showroom, where I chose the materials, drawer pulls, and accessories. I also picked up new ideas for my pantry, garage and home office!

In a matter of days, the systems were ready for delivery and installation. Prior to their arrival, my husband and I spent a weekend tearing out the old shelves, painting and patching the walls, and purging the contents of each space. It took the Closets to Go team less than two hours to install the new systems. They looked amazing!

Returning items to their proper place was the fun part. I had a good idea where things were going based on the drawings. For my son – there are places for coats and jackets, nice clothes, casual clothes, and school uniforms. He has a place for laundry (not that it always makes it there), shoes, sweatshirts, and some toys that he's quickly out growing. My daughter's closet has a section for tops, dresses, coats, school uniforms, dress-up clothes, and even too-big clothes. Will a closet system add to the value of your home? If you answered yes to any of these questions, then you're probably ready for a consult.
